Mr Kenneth Fang Hung 方鏗 has been a Court member of the University since 1990. Mr Fang is the Chairman of Fang Brothers Knitting Limited. He was the Chairman (1990-2001) and a member (1987-1990) of the Board of Governors of the Prince Philip Dental Hospital.

Mr James Hughes-Hallett 何禮泰 is Chairman of Swire Pacific Ltd, Cathay Pacific Airways Ltd and of John Swire & Sons (HK) Ltd. Mr Hughes-Hallett has been a Council member of the University since 1999.

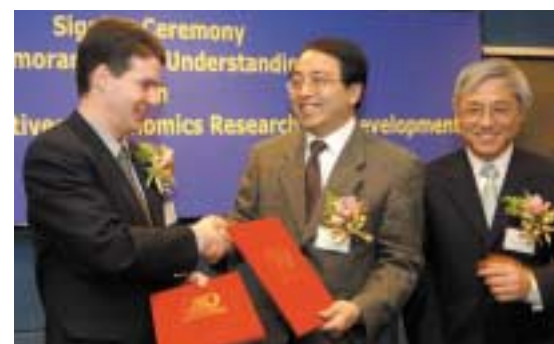

HKU Genome Research Centre Collaborates with Leading Canadian Genome Centre

The Genome Research Centre at HKU will be collaborating with one of the world's leading centres for genomics research. A memorandum of understanding on collaborative initiatives in genomics research and development was signed between the University and The Hospital for Sick Children of Toronto, affiliated with the University of Toronto, Canada, in January 2003.

"It is an excellent opportunity for The University of Hong Kong's new Genome Research Centre to enter into a collaboration with an established genome centre with such an excellent track record. I am proud that I have been able to act as a bridge between the scientific communities of Canada and China," said Professor Lap-Chee Tsui, Vice-Chancellor of HKU.

The memorandum of understanding will lead to important new advances in biomedical research, advance the understanding of disease mechanisms and develop diagnostic and therapeutic methods.

The Genome Research Centre, located at HKU, was established in 2002 to lead the development of genome research in Hong Kong, Southern China and the region. While the Centre is based at HKU, its services will be available for use by all universities in Hong Kong.

HKU Gets Top HKCEE Students

Results of the admission of outstanding secondary six students under the Early Admissions Scheme for Secondary Six Students introduced by the Government this year have been announced by the Joint University Programmes Admissions System (JUPAS). HKU is the university of first choice of all thirteen students in Hong Kong who obtained 10 Grade A(s)

in the HKCEE. These students have all been offered admission by the University and accepted the offer. Of tertiary institutions participating in this programme, HKU has admitted the highest number of outstanding sixth-formers. HKU has admitted 231 such students; The Chinese University, 167 and The University of Science and Technology, 34.
