# **ANNUAL REPORT** (1999-2000)

He did his job well explaining various aspects of his culture including language, songs, pipe-smoking etc.

All in all, every one had a nice time. It was a time to get together with family, alumni and friends. It was also a time to share and to learn about other people, other culture and most importantly the art of living together harmoniously.

This trip has well served our HKUAA (Ontario); sobjective, amongst others, to encourage educational, intellectual and cultural activities among members and with the local community!

## THE HKUAA (ONTARIO) CHINESE CULTURAL HERITAGE AWARD FUND

The Award Fund continues to be the proud sponsor of the scholarship to the three winning teams of the 9th Inter-Collegiate Chinese Debate Competition. This competition promotes the use of the Chinese language in the art of debate amongst university students in Ontario. The prizes were given out in January 2000.

In addition to the scholarship set up with the International Student Exchange Office of University of Toronto last year, we have successfully negotiated with York International of York University to set up a similar scholarship. With the funds raised from ¡§Citizen Hong Kong;", we have now established a perpetual annual scholarship with York University in the sum of C\$1,000 to sponsor a York student (irrespective of race, age, nationality, language) to promote or pursue Chinese culture and heritage by studying for credit in Hong Kong preferably at the Hong Kong University and to share that academic experience with York students and the community upon return, thereby furthering an understanding of Chinese heritage and culture. The recipient must be a registered York student residing in Ontario with financial needs and having been selected to participate in the Hong Kong University-York University Exchange Program.

In meeting with its objective to promote Chinese culture and heritage, the Chinese Award Fund also sponsored and helped to publicize the Beijing Dance Academy Performance in Toronto held on April 16, 2000 at the Seneca College.
